PARTIAL LIST OF PROJETS TO BE FUNDED: Replace exterior doors and panic bar hardware, replace evap coolers in lobby, library, and Blessed Sacrament Chapel, re-pad, reupholster, and repair kneelers, replace AC unit in Dominican residence, lawn/sprinkler and landscape work, repairs to roof on south side of building, re-carpet lobby and halls in Newman Center, furniture for lobby and library, replace sign in front of Center/new signage, repair weather damage to ramada, repair weather and termite damage to Dominican residence.

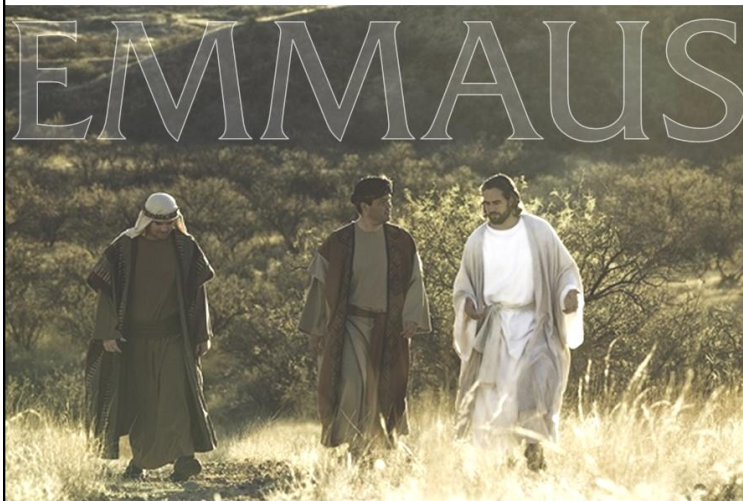

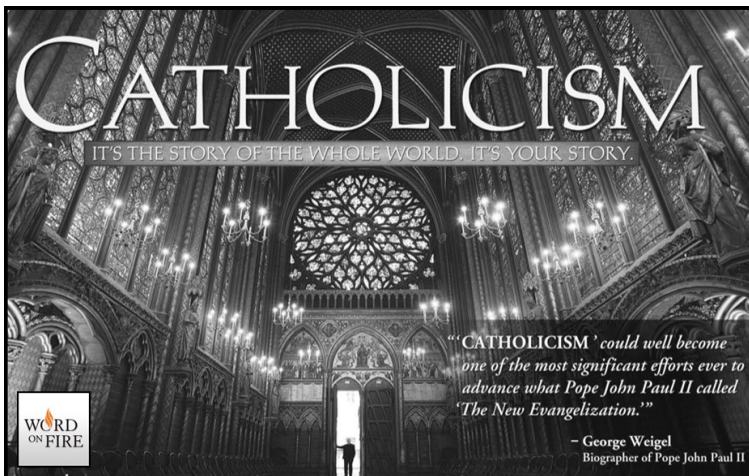

SUMMER & FALL PARKING PERMITS

You must be a registered Newman parishioner to receive a parking permit

Applications for summer & fall 2012 parking permits are being accepted through Friday, May 11.

- Summer permits are \$35 for each session (pre-session, Session 1, and Session 2) or \$100 for the entire summer.
- Fall permits are \$100.
- Save money & purchase a yearly parking permit for \$270 (valid Aug 2012-Aug 2013)

Those receiving permits will be notified by May 25. There will be no special status granted to people who've had a permit in the past.

A Newman parking permit grants the right to park in a Newman lot from **7:00 AM to 5:00 PM Monday-Friday ONLY**. No overnight parking.
