Fr. John Paul's Spiritual Brew

n St. Luke's version of the Beatitudes, we encounter not just the familiar "Blessed are you," but also the sobering "Woe to you." This contrast underscores that Jesus, in his fullness as both teacher and healer, is also the incarnate God who seeks profound transformation in all aspects of our being-mind, body, heart, and soul.

Luke's Beatitudes remind us that God's beloved are seen and upheld in their poverty-whether it be poverty of spirit, resources, or the longing for justice, dignity, and righteousness. Even in the face of mistreatment, for speaking and living in his name, we are not abandoned. God, the Creator and Restorer, holds us fast, supporting and lifting us up, no matter the circumstances.

Why? Because this is who God is. God does not delight in suffering, injustice, or in our failure to recognize the inherent worth of every person, whom God loves equally. Christ's expression of "woe" in Luke's Beatitudes highlights the sorrow that comes when we fail to honor the dignity and humanity of others, or when we contribute to the brokenness of the world.

Let us remember that our actions-both good and bad-have a ripple effect, not only on those around us but also on our ability to live out the grace we've received in our baptism. May we heed Christ's call to be his light in the world, to love even our enemies, and to do good without expecting anything in return.

The celebrant of the Mass will be Fr. Nathan Castle, OP who studied first for a Bachelor of Arts.



February 19 Lewis H. Latimer (1848-1928)

February 20 Henrietta Lacks (1920-1951)

Exploited for medical research/ "immortal cells" which have helped countless patients without the consent nor knowledge of her parents.



The cell line named for her, HeLa (pronounced hee-lah), has been at the core of treatments for hemophilia, herpes, influenza, leukemia, and Parkinson's disease as well as the polio vaccine, the cancer drug tamoxifen, chemotherapy, gene mapping, and in vitro fertilization.
